Socially Distanced Exhibition Opportunity for Portland Residents launches this week

The Corona virus pandemic and resulting lockdown has had a huge and catastrophic effect on the arts. With venues closed more and more artists exhibitions going online, what happens if you don't have good access to the internet?

b-side has come up with a simple but ingenious solution and has asked Portland residents to join in too. B-side is best known for its biennial Festival on Portland, the festival has had to be postponed this year but the b-side team are keen to make sure that everyone on Portland can still be part of their creative programme.

b-side's project space on Fortuneswell High Street has huge front windows, perfect for safe exhibiting! Following a call out on social media for anyone on Portland who has been making, and creating during lockdown a plethora of drawings, painting, poetry and craft has been sent to the team. These are being printed up into huge posters and exhibited in the two large street level windows for a few weeks at a time.

"Anyone who lives or works on Portland can take part. The lockdown has been really difficult for lots of people and making or creating has been a way of coping with this enormous change to our lifestyle. We have had some great entries already, many people have been rekindling their love of making during the lockdown - baking, sewing, painting, drawing and crafting and the results are wonderful, so do pop by and see for yourselves. This is our way of supporting the local community and celebrating resident's creativity during this strange time"

The exhibition kicks off with work from Portland artists Lyn Kirkland and Antje Rook who have both made work in direct response to the virus. Lyn has been recording her dreams during lockdown, creating images as soon as she has woken up and Antje has stitched embroidered viruses one for everyday of lockdown.

- b-side produces the b-side biennial festival a 9 day programme of events in visual art, text, sound and installations all in unusual places and spaces over the Isle of Portland. The festival generates thousands of visits to the many artworks uniquely created for the island.
